eil Allen joined Point Defiance Zoo & Aquarium (PDZA) as the new Aquatic Animal Curator in fall 2010. We sat down with him to learn more about why he came to PDZA and what he hopes to achieve in his new position.

Neil, you have a rich and varied professional background at aquariums across the country and around the world. Did you always know that you wanted to work in aquariums?

I fell into the aquarium business by accident. I was finishing some graduate studies at Stanford's Hopkins Marine Station in Monterey, California at the same time that David Packard (of Hewlett-Packard) was building the Monterey Bay Aquarium next door on old Cannery Row.

In 1982 I started assisting the project manager there and soon was hired as an aquarist to help collect fish and invertebrates for the new exhibits. I spent the next 15 years working as a collector, aquarist and research biologist.

In 1998 I helped open another aquarium, Colorado's Ocean Journey, in Denver. Six years later, I moved to Georgia Aquarium in Atlanta to help acquire fish, including the first whale

sharks ever displayed in the United States. Later, I was hired by the Oregon Coast Aquarium as their Curator of Fish.

Most recently, I spent a year working on : country. an aquarium in the United Arab Emirates in the Middle East and then jumped at the opportunity to come to PDZA as the new Aquatic Animal Curator - where I hope to stay.

Do you have a favorite experience during your time in the United Arab Emirates?

I loved working with the Sri Lankan staff when we collected black tip sharks in the Arabian Sea for the Sharjah Aquarium. When sharks got caught in our net, the staff would swim out to the barrier net, grab the three-foot fish in a bear hug and swim them back to the boat. The sharks wouldn't struggle for some reason and my staff acted as if this • was just an everyday occurrence. The sharks always survived their capture in good shape.

What attracted you to PDZA?

PDZA feels like a community within a community. It is deeply established in the hearts of people in the area and so has a strong support base. The staff share a strong sense of commitment to both the facility and the animals. It's a pleasure to work with such a dedicated and professional group of people.

Also, on a clear day, PDZA has one of the best scenic views of mountains and sound of any aquarium or zoo in the

What are your goals over the next few years? And what do you see as some of the biggest challenges?

We are primarily concerned with keeping the Rocky Shores and Aquarium exhibits as interesting and compelling as possible for our visitors. The animals are the driving force in keeping our visitors engaged and interested in coming back. Our team needs to keep the longstanding tradition of excellence going into the future.

One of our biggest challenges is working within older facilities. The North Pacific Aquarium is almost 50 years old and is showing its age. Areas of concrete are crumbling and much of the plumbing is very outdated. Upkeep and not compromising exhibit quality are constant challenges.

What has been your biggest surprise since you arrived?


It's not every workplace that you can hear gibbons calling in the morning when you're working at your desk. I feel like I'm working in an Asian jungle.




